Ozzie's Musing - A knotty problem

I've long felt that Scouting provides children and young adults with valuable life skills which they won't always get from their school or home education. Skills like teamwork and leadership, the value of being a good citizen, and a range of practical skills.

One such skill is a whole range of useful knots. Also various whippings and lashings (Keith Bell, our Scout Leader, was a strict disciplinarian). I've had cause to use quite a few knots over the years. Some regularly, some less so. The reef knot, of course, is used for all sorts of daily things: tying shoe laces, bin bags, etc. OK, technically shoelaces are a double-slipped reef knot, but it's the same principle. I use a round turn and two half hitches for holding up our washing line. I've even used the timber hitch (for hauling logs around the yard). A clove hitch will hold a donkey's halter securely to the shed when the farrier is trimming their hooves and can still be untied afterwards. The highwayman's hitch didn't work, they just made a quick getaway. A spliced loop comes in handy for farm gates, and if you splice it through the bars of the gate it stops the loop getting lost when the gate is left open. It's much tidier than the ubiquitous multiply grannyknotted red baler twine that most

farmers use. I discovered (the hard way) that one should secure a ladder when working at height, and a square lashing is a strong and simple solution to hold the ladder to a beam or scaffolding. I always use one now. But I thought I'd forgotten all those other weird and wonderful knots that I haven't used for over 40 years.

Until we went to a quiz last month. There were four rounds of 25 questions each and you could pick (in advance) a 'joker' round for which your score was doubled. One round was on knots. I said I might remember a few knots, so my team picked that as our joker. I.e. it would be my fault if we came last. We got a picture sheet of knots and to my own amazement as well as my teams a whole host of hitches and bends returned. The bowline, of course. The sheet bend. The rolling hitch. The diagonal lashing. You can probably remember those as well. But what about the Turk's Head? The Monkey's Fist? The Crown Knot?

Astonishingly, I found I still knew these. I even got the marlin spike hitch (although the spike in the picture was a clue). 23 out of 25 right, and we won the quiz handsomely. And what of the two that I didn't get? One was the Fireman's Chair Knot, which I called a Fireman's Hitch and the quizmaster refused to even give me half a point for (I felt robbed). And the other was this one



Congratulations if you know what it is. I didn't feel robbed for not knowing it, although perhaps I should have done.
